**National Night Out Against Crime** – Hyrum will be hosting the annual National Night Out Against Crime on Tuesday, August 2nd at 6:30 p.m. on the City Square in conjunction with many communities across Utah and the United States. National Night Out, a yearlong community building campaign, is designed to: 1) heighten crime prevention awareness, 2) generate support for, and participation in, local anticrime programs, 3) strengthen neighborhood spirit and police-community partnerships, and 4) send a message to criminals letting them know that neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

Hyrum will be providing free hamburgers as well as hosting various law enforcement groups as well as other community service providers. These groups will have information available as well as demonstrations. **Museum News** - Did you know that in 1921, people who attended the Cache County Fair usually rode the railroad into town and enjoyed horse pulling, fast harness and running races, motorcycle side-car races, wrestling, boxing, comedians, the better babies contest, and a mid-way. Admission prices ranged from ten to twenty-five cents. Many people from Hyrum throughout the last century have participated in the fair including Victor Israelsen and John A. Israelsen, who each had bulls win blue ribbons in 1923 and Connie Nielsen, whose wedding cake won a blue ribbon in 1947---the first fair since the beginning of World War II. Additionally, Hyrum's Community Booth received many awards over the years. Sadly, this agricultural tradition has ended, but you can come and see pictures of former Hyrum Community Booths at the museum during our Fun at the Fair Second Saturday event on Saturday, August 13<sup>th</sup> from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. We will also have a "fairly" fun children's art activity! The museum is excited to open a new exhibit about Hyrum's historic Main Street later this year, so we are looking for neat artifacts or collections relating to any of the old businesses on Main Street to include TEMPORARILY in our Community Exhibit, which will accompany the new permanent exhibit through the end of 2022. If you have something you'd like to display at the museum, please contact museum staff or just bring it in starting August 9<sup>th</sup>. Finally, as part of the Utah Humanities' Think Water Utah project, scholar Greg Smoak will be speaking about Utah Water Ways and the Bear River as the Wellsville Founder's Day Historical Speaker. He will speak on Tuesday, August 30<sup>th</sup> at 6:30 p.m. at the Wellsville LDS Stake Center, 30 South Center Street.
